KEY POINTS OF INTEREST

- Wester Moss a Butterfly Conservation Scotland nature reserve next to Fallin Bing, for great wildflowers and insects in spring and summer
- Dunmore Wood and The Pineapple ancient woodland, romantic estate and unique folly
- Higgins Neuk once the site of James IV's royal dockyard
- RSPB Skinflats nature reserve a haven for wading birds on the newly-created saline lagoons and salt marsh
- Kincardine Bridge historic 1930s swing bridge once the largest in Europe
- Clackmannan Tower 14th century tower house with views over the estuary plain
- Black Devon Wetlands RSPB nature reserve and awardwinning viewing screen
- Views across the Forth to the haunting remains of the WW2 **Bandeath Munitions Depot**
- 9. Cambus Pools Scottish Wildlife Trust nature reserve with reedbeds and open water attracting waders, warblers and wildfowl
- 10. Blackgrange bonded warehouses look out for the strange black whisky fungus that coats the trees and buildings
- 11. Cambuskenneth Abbey ruined Augustinian monastery and tomb of James III

THE STATS

DISTANCE: **ELEV GAIN:**

35.2 miles / 56.6km 993ft / 302m

Trails are intended as day-long walks or cycles, but route times will vary depending on speed and en-route stops.

GEAR

The route follows a mix of pavements, paths and trails. Make sure your footwear and clothing is appropriate for the weather and off-road paths. If cycling, there are some technical sections so you will need a bicycle with off-road capabilities.

Remember to follow the Scottish Outdoor Access Code.

ROUTE 2: BIRDING BY BIKE

A loop of the upper Forth estuary, crossing the river via the road bridge at Kincardine and returning across the footbridge at Cambuskenneth. The route takes in several wetland nature reserves as it winds across the lower carselands of the Forth. It's worth taking binoculars if you have them.

Take in the once-busy ports of Stirling, Higgins Neuk, Kincardine and Alloa; you'll also see signs of the Forth's rich industrial past all along the route.

There are potential start points at either Stirling or Alloa railway stations. At Stirling Station Stirling Active Travel Hub provides e-bike rental for Stirling residents, and Nextbike cycles and Forth Bike e-bikes are also available to hire.
