KEY POINTS OF INTEREST

- 1. Linlithgow Palace one of the principal residences of the monarchs of Scotland in the 15th and 16th centuries
- 2. Linlithgow Loch a natural freshwater loch from which the town gets name. The two islands in the loch are thought to be 5000-year-old crannogs
- 3. Avon Valley a picturesque path through a dramatic wooded gorge by the river
- 4. Antonine Wall – the route follows a section of this impressive turf wall - once the northernmost frontier of the Roman Empire
- 5. Kinneil Estate - birthplace of James Watt; estate woodland walks pass a Roman fortlet and historic kirk; and there's also a museum of local history
- 6. Kinneil foreshore – local nature reserve for shore birds, woodland and wildflower meadows on the site of the ex-Kinneil Colliery
- 7. Bo'ness harbour – once a vital link to the coal mines in the town, the harbour closed in 1959 as the railways took over.
- 8. Bo'ness & Kinneil Railway - heritage steam railway. Get the train to Kinneil or Birkhill stops to explore the area
- 9. Bo'ness Motor Museum from Bond cars to Only Fools and Horses and Harry Potter, lots of movie memorabilia
- 10. The Bridgeness Slab site of the Roman slab dating from 142 CE to mark the end of the Antonine Wall
- 11. Carriden House and Veluniate roman fort an historic site where people have lived for thousands of years
- 12. Airngath Hill and the Hope Monument panoramic views of the Forth

THE STATS

DISTANCE: 17.3 miles / 27.8km

Trails are intended as day-long walks or cycles, but route times will vary depending on 1815ft / 553m speed and en-route stops.

GEAR

The route follows a mix of pavements, paths and trails. Make sure your footwear and clothing is appropriate for the weather and off-road paths. If cycling, there are some technical sections so you will need a bicycle with off-road capabilities.

Remember to follow the Scottish Outdoor Access Code.

ELEV GAIN:

ROUTE 7 : BO'NESS & LINLITHGOW RAMBLE

A 20-mile circuit that starts and ends at Linlithgow Railway Station, which can be explored on foot or by bike. The route skirts Linlithgow Loch, travelling to Bo'ness and back via Airngath Hill, Bo'ness foreshore, Kinneil woods and the River Avon.

Rich in history, starting from a Royal palace, the route takes in numerous Roman forts and the Antonine Wall, stark in contrast to the industrial foreshore at Bo'ness with its harbour and ghosts of its maritime past.

Your journey winds through the historic estates at The Grange, Carriden and Kinneil, all of which played a big part in the area's long history.
