KEY POINTS OF INTEREST

This route links parts of each of the eight loops and combines them with linking sections that in many places coincide with either the NCN76 or the John Muir Way to create a truly memorable adventure through the unique history, wildlife and landscape of the Inner Forth.

- 1. Millhall Robert the Bruce defeated the English here at the Battle of Bannockburn in 1314
- 2. Antonine Wall the route follows a section of this impressive turf wall - once the northernmost frontier of the Roman **Empire**
- Bo'ness harbour once a vital link to the coal mines in the town, the harbour closed in 1959 as the railways took over
- Abercorn attractive village, church and museum, which holds some fascinating artefacts such as Viking hogback stones
- Charlestown & Limekilns heritage coastal villages with harbours and the largest limekiln complex in Scotland
- Torry Bay a Local Nature Reserve. The mudflats and saltmarsh are great for waders and coastal bird watching
- Black Devon Wetlands RSPB nature reserve and awardwinning viewing screen
- Cambus Pools Scottish Wildlife Trust nature reserve with reedbeds and open water attracting waders, warblers and wildfowl

Trails are intended as day-long walks or cycles, but route times will vary depending on speed and en-route stops.

GEAR

The route follows a mix of pavements, paths and trails. Make sure your footwear and clothing is appropriate for the weather and off-road paths. If cycling, there are some technical sections so you will need a bicycle with off-road capabilities.

Remember to follow the Scottish Outdoor Access Code.

ROUTE 9: STRAVAIG THE FORTH

A 78-mile alternative to the Round the Forth NCN 76, taking our adventurous stravaiger deep into the countryside bounding either bank of the Firth of Forth, to explore quiet rural tracks and lanes and accumulate a Munro's worth of ascent (3,037 feet in total).

One to work up to, do with friends or as a challenge. Don't underestimate it; the going is slow in places and the route devious and sometimes indirect; leave time for taking in the sights and enjoying some of the natural and historic features on the way.

There are plenty of opportunities for tasty, guilt-free on-trip refuelling.

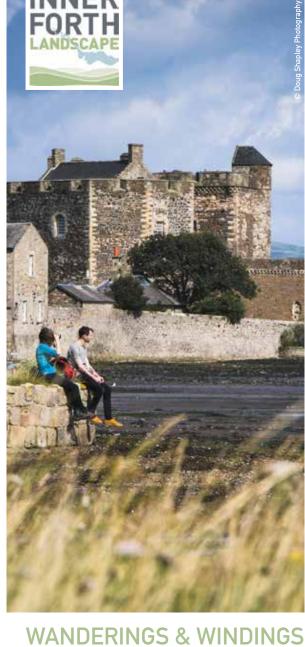
NAVIGATION
